In Seattle, Washington, on the west coast, in Boeing country, at Boeing Field you will find Museum of Flight. The people there are absolutely totally devoted to flight. There's a new elegant airy exhibition building built next to the Red Barn, Boeing's first aeroplane factory. There is an exhibition on the first years of aeroplane making in the very Red Barn and it ends up on the Apollo lunar expeditions and the landing on the moon. On your way you can admire the outstanding craftsmanship both in the making of aircrafts and in the restoration efforts in bringing those old artifacts to display. And check out the old Air Traffic Control Tower, viewing the traffic at Boeing Field.
